

Poverty Headcount Ratio


(PPP, in percent of population)

The change in poverty per unit growth can vary a lot.


Elasticity of Poverty Reduction to GDP per capita Growth


Differences in human development indicators are important.


Infant Mortality Rate (per 1,000 live births)



China: Disposable Income per Capita



Spending per capita on Education by Province, 2000 and 2008



Net State Domestic Product per Capita



Demographics China: Dependency ratio will increase


China: Number and Share of Population 60 and Over




India: Total Population and Labor Force

(In millions)






Conditional Cash Transfers have reduced inequality in Brazil

Tertiary School Enrollment


